# <u>Jeremiah 4</u>

#### Verse 1

• In our reading yesterday, several times the LORD said, "Return".

# Verse 2

- What would happen if they returned to Him?
- What an awesome thing, that the nations would be blessed through them. Do you remember in Genesis, this is what God said to Abraham, that all the nations would be blessed through him.

# Verse 3

• "Fallow" ground is soil that has been plowed but has been left unsown. The purpose is for crop rotation. What would this mean in regard to their spiritual lives?

#### Verse 4

- What is the picture here?
- Ezekiel 36:26, "Moreover, I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit within you; and I will remove the heart of stone from your flesh and give you a heart of flesh."
- Romans 2:28-29, "For a person is not a Jew who is one outwardly, and true circumcision is not something visible in the flesh. On the contrary, a person is a Jew who is one inwardly, and circumcision is of the heart—by the Spirit, not the letter. That man's praise is not from men but from God."

• What is the context of this verse? Is it about war? I've always heard it was about war. The context is about the people not being at peace with God.

- What did they not know how to do?

• The ancient paths would lead to the teachings to which they had apostacized.

• The watchman was the prophet. Did they listen?
